
2025/2026 Season

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Director's Message

It has been the most incredible honour for me to put together Wigmore Hall's 125th Anniversary Season programme. It's the culmination of many years' work, and I hope that you are as inspired and excited by it as we are here.

There will be a special two-week festival to mark 125 years of this beautiful Hall in Summer 2026, but the entire Season is also a celebration. We open with a joint appearance from Matthias Goerne and Maria João Pires on 9 September. Bach's St Matthew Passion is part of our opening month here with the Dunedin Consort, and his B minor Mass will be performed at St James's, Spanish Place with Vox Luminis and the magnificent Freiburg Baroque Orchestra. Watch out too for Elisabeth Leonskaja, Christian Tetzlaff, and Leif Ove Andsnes, as well as recitals from soprano Véronique Gens with James Baillieu, violinist Midori, and a 70th birthday celebration for the legendary jazz pianist and composer Fred Hersch. Bach cantatas are also presented as part of a programme from Les Arts Florissants.

October brings performances from countertenor of the moment Jakub Józef Orliński, the much-loved Mitsuko Uchida, and the Takács Quartet with the extraordinary young viola master Timothy Ridout. The impressive mezzo-soprano Anja Mittermüller visits us on 17 October alongside pianist Richard Fu. As the youngest ever winner of our Song Competition, hers is a unique talent and one to watch. Stephen Kovacevich and Martha Argerich join forces on 22 October, a rare opportunity to hear them both at Wigmore Hall.

We have a season-long residency from the Kanneh-Mason family, and Thomas Larcher is our Composer in Residence. There is also a series of 125th anniversary commissions from emerging composers.

Historical performance practices and artistic daring work together in harness whenever II Giardino Armonico make music. They have many appearances throughout the Season. The Tallis Scholars perform Palestrina, Byrd, and Josquin on 10 November. Harpsichordist Jean Rondeau presents an overdue celebration of Couperin right through the Season. Another overdue event is Barbara Hannigan's debut here with Bertrand Chamayou.

Christiane Karg and Gerold Huber present a programme of Christmas gems spanning six countries and two centuries on 1 December. Other seasonal performances come from the Choir of St John's College, Cambridge and Siglo de Oro, while Solomon's Knot brings us *Israel in Egypt* by Handel on 22 December. New Year's Eve can be spent in the company of lestyn Davies and The English Concert.

A public appeal will also be launched this season to finalise our Director's Fund, which now totals over £9 million. We hope to be fully independent of public funding by May 2026.

We all look forward to welcoming you here during our 125th Anniversary Season.

A recital with conversation led by Natasha Loges, exploring the staggering wealth of English song composers coming through the Royal College of Music (RCM) in the early part of the 20th century, and the strive to find a national musical voice to match that of Germany and Austria. Rebecca Clarke became the first woman to study composition with Charles Villiers Stanford at the Royal College of Music in 1907.
