Director's Message

Norwegian pianist Leif Ove Andsnes joins us twice in early 2025. On 12 January we celebrate his countrymen Edvard Grieg and Geirr Tveitt, as well as exploring the boundless universe of Chopin's 24 Preludes Op. 28. Leif Ove also has a close bond with the Mahler Chamber Orchestra, and with a small group of its musicians he performs Vierne's immense, brooding Piano Quintet on 12 March. Other highlights of our piano series include the poetic Alexander Gadjiev in an eclectic programme featuring Rachmaninov's impassioned Second Piano Sonata. Watch out too for Boris Giltburg's ongoing survey of Beethoven's piano sonatas, and Imogen Cooper in the same composer's final three sonatas. Grammy-winner Brad Mehldau's programme alternates between Fauré's Four Nocturnes and Brad's own reflections on Fauré.

Expect creative sparks to fly when the charismatic Sean Shibe duets with Sasha Savaloni, trailblazing champion of contemporary music. On 11 February, we celebrate William Christie's recent 80th birthday with his magnificent ensemble Les Arts Florissants. Nevermind's founders each had a hand in transcribing Bach's *Goldberg Variations* for a concert on 9 March, so do come along for that too.

Mischa Maisky and Martha Argerich perform works by Beethoven, Schubert and Grieg on 6 February, while the compelling baritone Konstantin Krimmel appears on 31 January (alongside pianist Ammiel Bushakevitz) in a programme of Loewe and Schubert, falling on Schubert's 228th birthday. Wolf's evocative settings of Tuscan and Venetian lyrics move from delight in small things to a sense of wonder at the vastness of creation and the all-consuming power of love; Louise Alder, Mauro Peter and Joseph Middleton perform the *Italienisches Liederbuch* on 21 February. A landmark event is Joyce DiDonato and Maxim Emelyanychev's performance of Schubert's *Winterreise* on 28 March.

Caroline Shaw's tenure as composer in residence continues, and we are also delighted to welcome Ensemble Klang and Klangforum Wien, very rare visitors to these shores. Mark your diaries for Bach's St John Passion on 26 February with the energising ensemble Solomon's Knot. We rarely hear Charpentier's Te Deum at Wigmore Hall, so do join La Nuova Musica for that on 18 February.

I look forward to welcoming you to the Hall during early 2025.
