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How does one choose a recital programme knowing it will be their last? With great difficulty! I always knew that one day, I would call time on my professional career. Why I knew that, I'm not sure, but three years ago I felt the need to make a decision, and so here we are.

In 1995, I discovered the wonderfully creative process of being an Artistic Director, and with this came an endless curiosity for repertoire I knew nothing about. Before then, I had focused mainly on core repertoire but gradually began to branch out, combining that with unfamiliar pieces as I went along.

Arriving at the programme you are about to hear, is perhaps a small culmination of all of the above, with the added ingredients of people who made deep impressions on me (**Boulanger**, Perlemuter), countries where I've felt a special bond and had the most amazing musical experiences (Norway, Argentina, Australia), pieces which hold deeply engraved memories (**Chopin**), pieces I love

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for their purity (Bach) and calling to the human spirit (Shostakovich), music reimagined (Shaw), traditional music (Grainger), the glittering transcription by Stephen Hough, and two composers who have had real importance for very different reasons; Fauré and Fitkin.

I first commissioned Graham Fitkin to write something invigorating as a way of celebrating my 40th at Wigmore Hall. After that, I knew I would have to play more - much more! For this rather unique programme, I have asked Graham to write one final piece for me and in effect, the last notes I will perform publicly. It's quite something and Rapid Unscheduled Disassembly, I promise you, will keep me busy until the last second!

I will be chatting about the programme after the first piece in each half, after which 'Musical Postcards' will unfold into my very special and deeply personal musical world. It has been the journey of a lifetime - thank you for sharing it with me.
