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Our programme 'Masterpiece' is, in essence, a chance for us to show off. Not our singing - although we might try to do a bit of that too - but our music library, and our ongoing commitment to commissioning new works from great composers. In so many cases, composers that we've commissioned have come back to us with unexpected, boundarypushing, genre-defying and sometimes hilarious works. This is something we take as a compliment, and the joy we get from this body of choral pieces is something we want to share with our audience throughout this programme. In addition to showcasing the five works we have commissioned (including two world premières), and a set of bespoke close-harmony arrangements, in this programme we are also celebrating some important musical anniversaries and the vibrant, living and evolving tradition of choral music today.

'The Alphabet' comes from Nonsense Madrigals, a set of six pieces written by the Hungarian composer György Ligeti between 1988 and 1993. This concert season we are celebrating what would have been Ligeti's 100th birthday. When he wrote these Nonsense Madrigals, 'The Alphabet' was designed to be the third out of a total of five, occupying the centre point in the sequence. As it happens, Ligeti ended up writing an 'extra' madrigal in 1993 and so 'The Alphabet' does not occupy this central position in the set, but it still offers a distinct and contrasting atmosphere to the rest of the set. Unlike the other madrigals in the group, which set surreal Victorian children's poems and stories (several from Alice's Adventures in Wonderland by Lewis Carroll), this movement simply articulates the letters 'A' to 'Z' in sequence, bringing to life - and into fullcolour - the very building blocks of the English language. From a modest chord containing just two notes for 'A', the movement expands wildly, with the musical language shifting and distorting as each letter brings new qualities and colours to the harmony.

The following work takes us to Scandinavia - an area of the world in which choral singing is part of its history and social fabric. We are pleased to present a brand new commission by the Norwegian composer Ola Gjeilo (b.1978), who has become one of today's leading composers of choral and piano music. With works written for many of the world's great choirs, orchestras and pianists, we are thrilled, through The King's Singers Global Foundation, to have commissioned A Dream Within a Dream, our first piece by Ola. It comes in three short movements, and sets a thought-provoking poem by the American poet Edgar Allan Poe, whose writing is often infused with themes of mystery, folklore and darkness. This poem questions reality: given how fragile our experiences are with the relentless passing of time, 'Is all that we see or seem but a dream within a dream?'

The contemporary British composer **Joby Talbot** (b.1971) wrote *The Wishing Tree* for The King's Singers in 2002, setting a beautiful text by the Scottish writer Kathleen Jamie. Talbot has become renowned for his versatility, writing everything from full-scale ballets like Alice in Wonderland and choral cantatas, through to film scores and pop arrangements. Talbot bases this piece on a strong rhythmic ostinato in triadic harmony, in which the alternating voice groups invoke a medieval style of composition called the *hocket*. This is contrasted by flowing vocal lines weaving around it, reflecting the unmoving stillness of an ancient tree in the wild and ever-changing Scottish landscape around it. Kathleen Jamie's poem has a strong environmental focus, remarking how even in the ancient and superstitious Celtic tradition of 'wishing trees', humans have so often poisoned the natural world - in this case with coins hammered into the wishing tree's bark. Despite this, as the poem concludes (in the voice of the tree), 'I am still alive; in fact, in bud'.

Francesca Amewudah-Rivers (b.1998) is a true polymath: a recent Oxford graduate who combines her composing with sound design and a flourishing acting career, which has included work at the National Youth Theatre, The Globe and for BBC TV. Fran's unique musical voice draws on many different strands of influence, including musical theatre and DJing experience, as well as her classical music background. This new commission, Alive, has words written by Fran herself, inspired by a feeling of deep connection to the physical, natural world around her and a desire to be actively conscious, mindful, and grateful for it. The commission was made with the generous support of The King's Singers Global Foundation - a charitable entity which exists to promote new music and music education.

The piece after which the whole programme is named is *Masterpiece*, by the British composer, pianist and teacher **Paul Drayton** (b.1944). It was written for the group in 1987, and aims to celebrate – or, in some cases, poke fun at – the various styles of composers from throughout Western musical history. The piece starts with a pastiche of JS Bach, and continues through a sequence of composers new and old, eventually finding its way back to Bach, with the aptly-worded: 'Bach again'! Despite never having been recorded and released, *Masterpiece* has become one of our most popular works both live and online.

As is customary in almost all of our concerts, we will end 'Masterpiece' the programme with a selection of close-harmony arrangements. Ever since the earliest days of The King's Singers, there has been a sprinkling of popular, folk and jazz music in even our most serious concert programmes. Many great arrangers have made these adaptations for our unique format of six voices, and we're going to close today's programme with a selection that includes a celebration of 100 years since the Disney Corporation was founded, and of the recent 80th birthday of Sir Paul McCartney (with whom the group worked closely in the 1980s).
